

From the Minister

Are you an evangelist? The words evangelism, evangelist and evangelical, all come from Greek word for "good mesword Gospel means good news. In ancient times, people wanted to be an evangelist because these were the people brought good news/messages to the rulers and were rewarded, whereas those been abused by mean-spirited preachers and manipulative politicians to make our current culture sceptical of those who use these words. These people twist the good message of Jesus Christ, as the one who conquered sin and death, into their own agenda of something else of much lesser consequence, leaving people without a lasting life-changing experience. As Christians, we know that that we are to share the good news of Jesus Christ, the whole news, that includes Jesus' resurrection, not just his death on the cross. God has given us eternal life, a loving grace-filled life, that people can experience today and every day, because of Jesus. God's love, fully revealed in Jesus Christ, brings us into right relationship with God and others. Jesus can to heal the world, deliver us from sin and lead us to new life with God and each other. The ultimate purpose of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection is not only reconciliation of individuals to God but also the reconciliation of "all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth" (Ephesians 1:10). God's love in Christ connects Christians to a common mission to redeem the world and restore all of humanity to the loving, saving, life-giving purpose of God that Jesus called the kingdom of God. The invitation to each of us is to recognize our deep need for realignment and healing, receive the grace that only God can give, and join with the church in participating in God's transformation of the world. Jesus told us to make disciples and transform the world (Matthew 28:19), but he did not tell us how to specifically do that. We do not have to share religious cliches and condemnations from bygone eras to tell the greatest story ever told. The good news of Jesus can be shared through own stories as well as the Gospel stories.

In previous months I have written about spiritual disciplines to help us grow in our faith: gift giving (financial and spiritual), prayer, and presence. The spiritual discipline I am sharing today is about being a 'witness.' There are many ways to bear witness through our actions and words. The Holy Spirit continues to work in and through us to help us experience wholeness of life and to share the good news, if we pay attention to it. Some are comfortable sharing their story of God's love for them, but other may believe that their story isn't dramatic enough to share it with others. Wherever you are, God doesn't intend for you to stay there. God can and will use your story if you are ready to share it. For many people, just your willingness to be vulnerable and share your life with them (good and bad) will be impactful.

In the Gospel of John, the first time we hear Jesus speak, he isn't preaching or praying, but simply asks a question of his would be disciples, "what are you looking for?" What is the deep longing of your heart, the hunger of your soul, in the darkness of the night? It could be something you didn't know you were looking for. John's Gospel then helps us realise the answer to that question, it Eternal life, which is defined as loving God and others with all we are and have, the way we are loved by God. This is not something we wait for, but something we get to experience every day, here on earth. It is a life of caring and healing (forgiving) others. What a testimony! What a witness! If only we could share this witness of the good news all the time. In John's Gospel the first example of evangelism is Andrew bringing Peter to Jesus, and Philip telling Nathaniel to "Come and see" (John 1:35-51). Often, our faithful witness is to tell others, to "come and see," see or experience for themselves, as Jesus has touched me, he will touch you too. Come and see Christ at work serving the poor or worshiping the Lord, through his body, the Church, through us. Witnessing is about building relationships and sharing our stories of what God has done for us in a genuine and natural way. It's often been said that sharing

Christ is like one beggar telling another beggar where to find bread. Yours may not seem very dramatic, compelling, or special. Maybe you don't feel that religion is something that ought to be brought up in conversation. It's too private, too personal, and too individual. But we have a story to tell, we have many stories to tell, and they are powerful, even if we don't think they are dramatic. Evangelism is sharing your story in whatever way God has uniquely wired you to do so. It's about doing the work of Christ and being his witness in the way you live your life. Regardless of how you do it, the important thing is that you do it. In the end, that's all Jesus calls each of us to do.

Practise the spiritual discipline of "witnessing." Tell the story of Christ this year, build relationships and tell your story, dramatic or not, perhaps it will touch someone, just one person, and change them forever!

GOOD NEIGHBOUR SCHEME

Can we help you or someone you know?

Our Good Neighbour Scheme is here to help anyone living in the Guisborough area, including our Church family members. Please give us a call if you feel we may be able to help. The main services we can provide are shown below, but if oth-



er needs arise that cannot otherwise be met, then we may be able to offer some practical help or advice.

Good Neighbour Scheme Services

Transport – lifts for those who would otherwise have difficulty making necessary journeys.

Such journéys include attending local doctors' and hospital appointments, visiting relatives in hospital, etc. Not intended as a general taxi service! No charge is made. Users who wish to make a contribution to the scheme may of course give a donation.

Hospital visiting – this is for those in local hospitals who would otherwise have few visitors. There is a link to Transport to provide lifts for relatives who have difficulty making the journeys for hospital visits.

Home visiting – this is for those who are sick, lonely or housebound and who are not receiving sufficient visits or offers of help. The service here includes visiting simply to offset loneliness or perhaps providing some practical help such as shopping. The service can involve either short term visiting, say for someone who has recently returned home from a stay in hospital, or longer term for someone with an ongoing need.

How to request help – Call in to see our receptionist in the Church Office between 10am and 12 noon on any Monday or Wednesday, or telephone and leave a message at any time on 01287 610349.

My book of the month is "The Life-A Portrait of Jesus" by J.John and Chris Walley. A great start in this book is the sentence "whatever background we come from, Jesus deserves our attention...the real authentic Jesus is a rather unsettling figure who both comforts those who are troubled and troubles those that are comfortable". The authors state that this "book is written both for those who would claim to have faith in Jesus but would like to know more about him and for those who are just looking".


The authors also state that in writing the book they have two aims. "First, it is a *guide* to who Jesus was, what he said, what he did and what he means for people today. Secondly, it is intended as a *defence* of the Jesus of the gospels....it is a restatement of the traditional, mainstream view of who he was." The book reminds the reader that the life of Jesus is "perhaps the best attested life in the ancient world...[with] firm evidence" in the Bible and outside of it to support this.

The book looks at the various elements that together contribute to the life of Jesus such as the role of the twelve disciples (Why were there twelve? Why were they important to Jesus? Why are they important to us?); the miracles that Jesus performed (their importance then and now) and the significance of Jesus's teaching using parables (Why did he do that?).

Although the book is easy to read it doesn't dodge the "tricky bits" that might arise around historical accuracy or some of the harsher elements of Jesus's teaching. I think this is a fabulous book and it is well worth buying a copy to read and re-read or as a gift to someone you know that is "looking". The book is well structured and clearly and carefully looks at the various aspects of Jesus's life from his birth, death, and resurrection. The book tackles head on arguments for and against Jesus being who he said he was. The chapter on "The Resurrection" is wonderfully written and carefully directed at non-believers and believers. The book shows that for those "who truly want to find the risen Jesus...as Saviour, King and Lord of their lives [they] can still find him" and as

Bear Grylls says " if Jesus Christ really is risen from the dead, it changes everything...And if He is right here, right now-beside us, for us and within us-then our day really should be full of joy and assurance".

The 12 days of Christmas

The song originated in France, first appearing in this country in translation in 1780, in a book for children called 'Mirth without Mischief'.

This is what the church said it meant, as a means of teaching the Catechism:

- 1.The partridge = Jesus The Tree = the fall of Adam and Eve
- 2. turtle doves = Old and New Testaments
- 3. French hens= Faith , Hope and Love
- 4. calling birds = the 4 Gospels
- 5. gold rings = 1st 5 books of the OT (the Torah)

Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy

- 6. geese a-laying = the 6 days of creation
- 7. swans a-swimming= the gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, counsel, understanding, fortitude, knowledge ,piety, and fear of the Lord
- 8. maids a-milking = the 8 beatitudes
- 9. ladies dancing = the fruit of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self —control
- 10.Lords a-leaping = the 10 commandments
- 11. Pipers piping = the 11 faithful disciples
- 12.Drummers drumming = the 12 points of belief as set out in the Apostle's Creed.

Our calendar

We take the calendar very much for granted nowadays, but for well over 2000 years it has been regulated from the birth of Christ. Any time before the Birth of Christ is known simply as years 'BC', (Before Common Era to Jews and Muslims) and from then it is known as AD (Anno Domini) the year of our Lord, thanks to the Romans (or Common Era) Now that places Jesus as the most important person in all of history!

The ancients who wrote the Old Testament wrote that the world was built in 7 days, or stages as we would see it now, and that was influenced by the Babylonian establishment of 7 days in a week, with the 7th being the day to worship the Sun.

The names of all the weekdays linger in our modern calendar, all named after other 'gods'. SUNday, MOON day, TIWSday, WODENsday,THORs day, FREYAsday, and SATURNsday.

The Roman calendar originally had 9 days to a week, but the widespread 7 day tradition used by the Jews won over the Romans and the Greeks as well.

The first Roman calendar had only 10 months, all of 30 or 31 days, the remaining days regarded as 'Winter'. But influenced by various religious festivals, the Romans settled eventually on 12 months, calling the winter months after Janus, (January) the god with two faces, and Februa. The year started at Mars (March) followed by Aprilis, Maius and Juno. Then came Quintilis (5th month) later named Julius (July) after Julius Caesar, and Sextilis (6th)later called Au-

gustus after another Caesar. Sept (7), Oct (8), Nov (9) and Dec (10) were the remaining months according to the Latin numbers.

The Romans celebrated their winter festival on December 25th, and the church converted it to our Christmas Day!

Gift Aid

This is the easy way for tax payers to increase your regular giving to our church which is FREE.

As we struggle to improve our church finances, I encourage you to complete a simple Gift Aid declaration form. This will allow our church to reclaim the standard rate of tax you pay for the current tax year on the amount of your giving.

For every £1 you donate we can claim a tax refund of 25p.

You can Gift Aid your giving over the past 4 years and all future giving by completing one simple form.

If you change your name or address then you must complete a new declaration form and if you no longer pay tax you must cancel your declaration.
