WEEK 7: SERVICE RESOURCES

THEME: THE SPIRIT COMES

MAIN READING: Acts 2.1-21

When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues[a] as the Spirit enabled them.

Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard their own language being spoken. Utterly amazed, they asked: "Aren't all these who are speaking Galileans? Then how is it that each of us hears them in our native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!"

Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?" Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine."

SECOND READING if required: Joel 2.28-32

And afterward I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days. I will show wonders in the heavens and on the earth, blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and dreadful day of the Lord. And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved; for on Mount Zion and in Jerusalem there will be deliverance, as the Lord has said, even among the survivors whom the Lord calls.

CALL TO WORSHIP

WEEK 7: REFLECTION

Today, we celebrate Pentecost.

The day the Holy Spirit showed up—for real.

The Book of Acts presents a striking depiction of the first Pentecost: a sound like a fierce wind, flames of fire appearing on Jesus' followers, and their sudden and inexplicable ability to speak in multiple languages. Peter delivers his first sermon, and 3,000 people queue up to be baptised.

You don't see that every Sunday in church, do you?

At the first Pentecost, the church was born. Like many other birth stories, this one is messy, wonderful, and chaotic—a day to remember and celebrate. But is that all Pentecost is? A day to reflect on the Spirit's chaos and beauty with nostalgia? Or is there something about the Spirit's arrival that is true and relevant for us here? Now?

Consider this brief passage from the Gospel of John, featuring Jesus' conversation with his friends at the table during the Last Supper:

"I have much more to say to you than you can now bear. But when the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth. He will not speak on his own; he will speak only what he hears and tell you what is yet to come." (John 16:12-13, NIV)

This scene is much more subdued than the one in Acts. There is no fire, violent winds, or foreign languages. It is just Jesus talking with his disciples. He doesn't mention any special day for the Spirit's arrival. Instead, Jesus discussed the Spirit's continued day-to-day presence in the lives of believers and in the life of the church.

While I adore the chaotic and vibrant scenes in Acts, I find myself preferring this quiet conversation and the promise of the Spirit even more. It serves as a reminder that the Spirit manifests not merely on one day, nor only in loud and flashy manners through mass conversions and miraculous acts.

Praise God for those images of the Spirit's work—but I've never had flames of fire alight on me—and, frankly, I can do without that, thanks. And while it would be rather useful if I could suddenly speak perfect Greek or Hebrew and instantly read the entire Bible in its original language this afternoon, I haven't yet been blessed with that gift either.

But the encouraging news from Jesus for today is that the Spirit continues to appear in subtle ways, too—right in the midst of our daily lives. These are the instances when we glimpse God's activity in the world or feel inspired or uplifted by the splendour of heaven in God's creation.

The Spirit shows up in our ordinary life together as the church. We don't gather to maintain an ancient institution, find correct answers in a dead book, or worship a God who is stuck in history or way up there in the cosmos.

We are united and invigorated by the God who is with us, whose Spirit guides us, brings us hope, and walks beside us even now. God's Spirit is present, as near as our next breath, as intimate as our own heartbeat.

And God's Spirit is at work among us, doing something new. "I still have many things to say to you," Jesus tells his disciples, "but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of Truth comes, he will guide you into all truth."

How is the Spirit showing up, guiding us, inviting us to follow her trail now?

Does God still speak?

- Can the Spirit breathe hope into our lives when we are stuck in cycles of grief and pain?
- Can the Spirit breathe new life into ordinary congregations and churches?
- Can the Spirit breathe new creation into our relationship with God and with others?

Jesus says yes.

It doesn't require dramatic visions or heavenly voices. You needn't speak in tongues or even wave your hands and shout amen (though you certainly can!).

The Spirit manifests in the aspects of our lives that are so very human—the sorrow and joy, the blood, dirt, and grime of everyday life.

Consider the subtle ways the Spirit operates: in the gentle nudge to reach out to a friend who needs encouragement, the sudden clarity amidst confusion, and the unexpected peace during a storm of anxiety.

The Spirit is evident in laughter shared around dinner tables, in the kindness of strangers, and in the resilience we discover when we believed we had none left.

And that makes sense, doesn't it? After all, the God of the universe became incarnate as a real human being, Jesus of Nazareth—blood, sweat, and tears included. And as his followers, God's Spirit comes and makes herself incarnate in us—blood, sweat, and tears included.

The Spirit is not done with us. The Spirit shows up in a living partnership with us to continue and express the good news of Jesus Christ through making our churches into sanctuaries where all God's children are welcomed, respected, loved, and seen for the image of God that they are.

The Spirit is at work when communities come together to support those in need, when forgiveness is offered after long-held grudges, and when justice is sought with compassion and courage.

The Spirit infuses our worship with life, not due to polished performances, but because hearts are truly seeking God.

This Pentecost, let us celebrate not only the remarkable events of the past but also the continual, everyday presence of the Spirit. Let us be vigilant to the subtle whispers, the gentle guidance, and the ordinary miracles occurring all around us.

Come, Holy Spirit. Fill our hearts. Renew our minds. Transform our lives.

A Prayer for Pentecost

Come, Holy Spirit, Breath of God, breath of life, breath of hope— Fill us anew. We celebrate the day You came in wind and fire, Lighting hearts, birthing the Church, But we also cherish the quiet ways You come— In whispers, in nudges, in the steady rhythm of our daily lives. Spirit of Truth, quide us. Speak to us in the language of our hearts, In the spaces where words fail, In the silence where we listen for You. When we are weary, breathe strength. When we are lost, light the way. When we are broken, bring healing. When we are stuck in grief or fear, breathe new life. Make us aware of Your presence— Closer than our next breath, Nearer than our own heartbeat. Kindle in us the fire of Your love, Not always with flames that dazzle, But with the steady glow of faithfulness, The warmth of compassion, The spark of courage to follow where You lead. Shape our communities into places of welcome, Sanctuaries of grace, Where all are seen, loved, and valued As Your beloved children. You are not done with us. You are still speaking, still moving, still creating. So here we are, Lord— Open, willing, waiting. Come, Holy Spirit. Amen.



He Qi: Holy Spirit Coming

The vibrant, colourful work of Chinese artist He Qi tells a powerful story about the mysterious, unpredictable movement of the Holy Spirit.

He Qi's journey into Christian art is as vibrant as his paintings. Growing up in China, where Bible study was forbidden, he found an unexpected doorway to faith through art. It wasn't the words of Scripture that first drew him in—it was the colours, symbols, and unspoken power of Christian imagery. Over time, his curiosity grew into a calling.

After moving to the United States, He Qi (pronounced "Huh Chee", in case you were wondering) immersed himself in the biblical tales that initially stirred his heart. His bold, colourful style blends traditional Chinese folk art with Western religious themes, resulting in works that are both timeless and contemporary. His work does not merely depict biblical scenes—it breathes life into them, capturing the movement of the Holy Spirit in every brushstroke.

Through his art, He Qi connects cultures, languages, and hearts, inviting viewers to experience the gospel in vivid colour.

That curiosity sparked something inside him. Though he wasn't well-versed in the scriptures behind the images, he could feel an unspoken power and presence interlaced within the artwork. Gradually, he began to grasp the profound symbolism and meaning concealed within the colours and forms. After moving to the U.S., he finally pieced together the biblical stories that had captivated him for so long.

First, let's remind ourselves of the seismic events of the first Pentecost.

Now, when the day of Pentecost had arrived, they were all united in one place. Suddenly, a sound came from the heavens like the rushing of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were seated. Tongues resembling fire appeared and were distributed to them, with one resting on each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit enabled them to do so. (Acts 2.1-7a)

Qi's portrayal of the Day of Pentecost intricately weaves together all these threads. It encapsulates the birth of the Church and the electrifying moment when the Holy Spirit was granted to the disciples. Rather than traditional flames, Qi uses doves to symbolise the Spirit's descent, a symbol that evokes movement and intensity. Bright Chinese lanterns and candles light up the scene, emphasising the festive, celebratory nature of Pentecost.

Here's a closer look at what makes this piece so compelling: The painting immediately grabs you with its vibrant palette and fluid brushstrokes. The colours seem to dance across the canvas, evoking the lively, unpredictable movement of the Holy Spirit. Each hue isn't just a colour; it's a symbol—an echo of the warmth, passion, and transformative power that the Spirit embodies.

In "The Holy Spirit Coming" He Qi masterfully uses symbols that resonate with Eastern and Western spiritual traditions. Fiery doves flutter against a backdrop that might remind you of flickering candle flames—an allusion to Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples as tongues of fire. This melding of images creates a layered narrative, inviting viewers to explore deeper spiritual truths.

The work stands at the intersection of diverse cultures and histories. Growing up in a context where the Bible was off-limits, He Qi found a unique portal to explore faith in Christian art. In this piece, his journey comes full circle. The painting acts as a bridge—connecting the mysticism of his early artistic influences with the biblical narratives he later embraced. It reminds us how art can transcend boundaries, inviting us all to experience the divine.

Beyond its striking visuals, this work challenges us to look inward. It asks us to recognise the presence of the Spirit not just as a historical or biblical event but as a living, breathing force within our own lives. The energy depicted in the painting encourages viewers to reflect on their experiences of divine guidance and transformation. Essentially, "The Holy Spirit Coming"isn't just a painting—it's an immersive experience.

But look even closer—the background is filled with intriguing details: the closed doors of the Upper Room, the sturdy temple columns of Jerusalem, humble peasant homes, and a simple stone bridge. That bridge, in particular, holds special significance. For Qi, it symbolises the very heart of Pentecost: the bridge where heaven meets earth. It's as if all the movement of the Holy Spirit travels back and forth across this bridge. Our prayers rise to God, carried by the Spirit, and God's narrative of grace and salvation reaches us similarly.

It's a powerful metaphor. The Holy Spirit isn't just a distant force; it's the bridge connecting us directly to the divine. Martin Luther captured this beautifully in his explanation of the Apostles' Creed: "I believe that I cannot by my own understanding or strength believe in Jesus Christ or come to him, but instead the Holy Spirit has called me through the gospel."

An Invitation to Personal Reflection

Recall the first time you felt the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. Take a moment to become aware of that same Spirit with you and within you right now. Offer a prayer of gratitude to God for the precious gift of His Spirit in your life.

Reflect on the different names for the Holy Spirit: Advocate, Comforter, Counselor, Guide, and others. Do any of these resonate with your personal experiences of the Spirit? As you remember those moments, express your thankfulness for the many ways God has revealed Himself to you through His Spirit.

As you gaze at today's image, what captures your attention? Are your eyes drawn to the candle's flames or the fiery doves? What other details in the image stir your imagination and connect you to that first Pentecost moment? Envision yourself within the scene, holding onto Jesus' promise that He "will give you another Helper, to be with you forever," and that this Helper will "dwell with you and will be in you" (John 14:16-17).

Observe the various locations depicted in the image. In the book of Acts, the Spirit fills individuals from "every nation under heaven," astonishing them as they hear one another speaking in their native languages. Are there people or groups you find difficult to understand, connect with, or love? Invite the Spirit to perform His Pentecost work in your heart. Pray for the grace to love, serve, and advocate for those whom God brings to your mind.

Take a few moments to reflect on areas where love and compassion are absent—places damaged by racism, inequality, and injustice. Pray that the same Spirit would break down walls of hostility and open hearts to genuinely listen to the voices of the marginalised and oppressed.

Ultimately, calm your heart, concentrate on your breath, and recognise that the Spirit is present in every breath you take. Seek the Spirit's guidance towards opportunities for love and reconciliation. Pray to be an instrument of His peace, unity, and transformative power in the world.

This Pentecost Sunday as we celebrate the mysterious movement of the Holy Spirit, we can reflect on the bridge that extends from our hearts to God's, carrying our hopes, our faith, and the eternal story of Christ's love.

WEEK 7: SPIRITUAL EXERCISE

Life can be chaotic.

Our days are filled with responsibilities, distractions, and an endless stream of tasks demanding our attention.

Amidst this busyness, it's easy to lose sight of God's presence.

But what if we could create a tangible reminder of Him right in our own homes or workspaces?

A **sacred space** serves as a simple yet powerful way to invite God into our daily routine, providing a sanctuary where we can pause, pray, and reconnect with Him.

What is a Sacred Space?

A sacred space is a designated area in your home, office, or any personal environment where you intentionally set aside time for prayer, meditation, or reading Scripture.

It need not be elaborate or large—a quiet corner, a chair by a window, or even a small desk can serve as a place of retreat.

The key is to create an environment that encourages stillness, reflection, and communion with God.

Just as churches have altars and sanctuaries, a sacred space in your daily life serves as a **physical reminder** of your spiritual commitment.

It becomes a place where you can step away from the noise and realign your heart with God's presence.

How to Create Your Sacred Space

1. Choose a Location

Look for a quiet spot where you can step away from distractions. It could be:

- A cozy chair in your living room
- A corner in your bedroom
- A peaceful spot in your backyard
- A desk in your office where you can keep a Bible or devotional

Wherever it is, choose a space that allows you to focus and be still.

2. Make It Meaningful

Enhance your sacred space with elements that draw you closer to God

Consider adding:

- A Bible or devotional book A source of Scripture and inspiration
- A candle or lamp A reminder that Jesus is the Light of the world
- A journal A place to record prayers, reflections, and gratitude
- A cross or religious symbol A visual reminder of faith
- Nature elements Flowers, stones, or plants to reflect God's creation

Keep it simple and uncluttered.

The goal is to create an environment that fosters peace and spiritual connection

3. Establish a Daily Ritual

Having a sacred space holds significance, but its consistent use is what truly empowers it. Establish a daily or weekly practice that enables you to engage with God in a purposeful manner. Some ideas include:

- Morning prayers Start the day in quiet communion with God
- **Lighting a candle** A small but significant act to mark your sacred time
- Reading Scripture Reflecting on God's Word before meals or at bedtime
- **Silent meditation** Taking a few deep breaths and centering your heart in God's presence

Incorporating a small ritual makes this space a natural part of your day.

The Power of a Sacred Space

Creating a sacred space is not about making your home look like a monastery; it's about cultivating intentionality.

When life feels overwhelming, this space serves as a refuge. When distractions pull you away, it reminds you to pause. When you seek God's presence, it provides a dedicated place to meet Him.

The beauty of a sacred space is that it's **always available**. Whether you spend five minutes or an hour there, each moment spent in quiet reflection deepens your awareness of God's faithfulness.

Bringing It Into Your Life

You needn't wait for a perfect moment to begin. Start where you are. Choose a place, set it apart, and use it as a space for prayer and connection with God.

Over time, this sacred space will evolve into more than merely a physical location—it will become a gateway to deeper faith, a reminder of God's unwavering presence, and an invitation to pause and refocus on what truly matters.

God is always near.

Sometimes, all we need is a quiet place to recognise it.

WEEK 7: BONUS EXERCISE

Mornings establish the tone for the rest of the day. The way we begin can shape our mindset, our actions, and our ability to stay present to God's presence in everything we do.

Rather than rushing into the demands of the day, taking a few quiet moments for a Morning Awareness Prayer can truly make a difference. This simple yet powerful practice enables us to commence the day centred, mindful, and receptive to the ways God is moving in our lives.

Why Begin the Day with Prayer?

Life moves fast. The moment we wake up, we're bombarded with thoughts—things to do, responsibilities, worries.

But before checking emails or diving into tasks, imagine pausing to take a deep breath, inviting God into the day ahead.

Prayer in the morning is not merely about seeking God's assistance; it involves attuning our hearts to His presence, aligning our actions with His will, and moving through the day with a profound awareness that we are not alone.

As Psalm 5:3 reminds us, "In the morning, Lord, you hear my voice; in the morning I lay my requests before you and wait expectantly."

How to Practice Morning Awareness Prayer

1. Find a Quiet Moment

Before reaching for your phone or beginning your routine, take a moment to simply be still. Sit up in bed, step outside, or find a quiet spot where you won't be disturbed. These first few minutes of the day present an opportunity to connect with God before the noise of life takes over.

2. Take a Deep Breath

Close your eyes and take a slow, deep breath in. Hold it for a moment, then exhale slowly. Allow each breath to remind you of God's presence, His peace, and His sustaining grace. Breathing deeply helps to clear the mind and brings awareness to the present moment.

3. Offer a Simple Prayer

Your prayer doesn't have to be long or complicated. Speak from the heart, using words like:

"Lord, thank You for this new day. Help me to be aware of Your presence in everything I do. Guide my thoughts, my words, and my actions so that they reflect Your love. Let me see You in the small moments, and remind me that I am never alone. Amen."

4. Set an Intention for the Day

Consider asking yourself a question like:

- How can I reflect God's love today?
- Where might I see God at work?
- Who can I encourage or serve?

Setting a spiritual intention can shape your mindset and keep your heart attuned to God's presence throughout the day.

5. Carry Awareness into Your Day

The goal of the Morning Awareness Prayer is not just a moment of reflection but a continuous mindfulness of God's presence. As you go through your day, return to that morning prayer. When challenges arise, recall the peace you felt in those guiet moments. When blessings come, whisper a guick "Thank You."

The Power of Starting the Day with God

By beginning the day with awareness and prayer, we shift our focus from chaos to clarity, from anxiety to peace. We train our hearts to seek God in ordinary moments—while making breakfast, during a conversation, or during a quiet commute.

Just as Jesus often withdrew to pray in the early mornings (Mark 1:35), we can also benefit from starting our day in communion with God. It doesn't take long—a few minutes of stillness, a whispered prayer—but it has the power to transform our experience of the day.

So, tomorrow morning, before the world demands your attention, take a moment.

Breathe. Pray. Invite God into the day ahead, and observe how His presence unfolds in the most unexpected places.
